Moncton woman uses history with chronic pain to help children

Mylène Pinet loves working with kid in what she calls her "dream joh"

in what she calls her "dream job."
As communications coordinator for Solutions for Kids in Pain, Pinet helps to get them answers to what's causing their chronic pain - answers she wishes she'd had when she was younger and also battling chronic pain - and solutions to help them live with it.


"I was one of those sick kids," said Pinet, 28. "It's because I had the opportunity to learn those solutions so young that I can live the life I have now."

But before Pinet was diagnosed with Ehlers-Danlos syndrome, she and her family were left wondering why she was always in pain.

Growing up in Moncton, she says she was around six or seven when she began telling her parents that her legs and feat hurt.

"I was always tired and kind of lethargic," she said, noting that most days it was a struggle to get out of bed be-

Eventually, the pain spread to her hips, hands, stomach and head, some-



This year was both challenging and rewarding



2020-2021 Impact

SKIP has established a reputation regionally, nationally, and internationally. This year, we strengthened local ties, worked to change policy, and crossed a couple of oceans with our engagement efforts!

International

SKIP was highlighted in *Delivering transformative* action in paediatric pain: a Lancet Child & Adolescent Health Commission, and was delighted that four of its twenty esteemed contributors were part of the SKIP network. The commission brought together stakeholders to enable transformative change in pediatric pain management, establishing four goals: to make pain matter, make pain understood, make pain visible, and make pain better.

National

In the spring of 2021, the Canadian Pain Task Force released its final report, *An action plan for pain in Canada*. Contributors included Dr. Jaris Swidrovich, a member of our Board of Directors, and Dr. Fiona Campbell, one of our Central Canada Hub Co-Leads, who served as Co-Chair of the Task Force.

Call for Innovations

A Call for Innovations was launched in partnership with Healthcare Excellence Canada to identify established and emerging innovations in virtual care to support youth with chronic pain and their families. The Call for Innovations Merit Review Panel chose eight innovations and awarded two the top established and top emerging innovations.

Vaccine Pain and Needle Fear Survey

SKIP and Healthcare Excellence Canada conducted a national online survey to explore contributors to vaccine hesitancy in the context of the COVID-19 pandemic.

Digital Engagement with Parents

SKIP and Ehm & Co. co-produced and mobilized tools related to vaccine pain, needle fears, and virtual care for parents and caregivers on *YMC.ca*. Together, the *Facebook Live event*, two articles (*More Than Ever Vaccines Are Crucial But My Daughter Is Terrified of Needles, Why Virtual Doctor Visits Are The Gift That Keeps On Giving For My Family*), two videos (*Mom Hack: When Kids Are Afraid of Needles, How To Get The Most Out Of Your Virtual Doctor Visits*), one interactive quiz, and an e-blast to over 50,000 parentshad over 1.3 million impressions online.

Spark: Live webinars

In partnership with Children's Healthcare Canada, SKIP co-hosted seven Spark: Live webinars, hosted by SKIP Knowledge Broker Paula Robeson. These included *Championing pain within your organization in the time of COVID* featuring SKIP Patient Partner Jenny Sun, and *Comfort in pediatric critical care: a challenging new priority in the management of pediatric critical illness* featuring SKIP Patient Partner Marie-Claire Shanahan.

The Rounds "Ask Me Anything"

In partnership with The Rounds, SKIP hosted four "Ask Me Anything" virtual events: *Opioids, Pain, and Teens: Minimizing Risk, Maximizing Benefits, Harnessing Digital Technologies to Improve Pain Care in Children, The broader context of pain: Bridging the gap between physical and mental health*, and *Making Immunizations Comfortable for Children and Parents*. Together, these events reached almost 9,500 health professionals, and the posts were viewed almost 13,000 times on The Rounds internal platform.

Conquering the Hurt Conference

During the Conquering the Hurt conference hosted by our Central Canada Hub at SickKids, SKIP led a panel session on "Inflicting and treating pain: A discussion of contexts that produce and exacerbate pain in children." The conference gathered more than 300 attendees including health professionals and people with lived or living experience with pain.

Pulse Knowledge Mobilization Challenge

SKIP collaborated with Dalhousie University's Pulse Health Innovation Sandbox Knowledge Mobilization training program. We engaged 31 undergraduate and graduate students in three key pediatric pain areas: helping children with pain in school, using numbing cream during needle pokes, and engaging Pain Champions across Canada. Jump in with SKIP

We continued to deepen knowledge mobilization capacity among researchers with our *Jump in with SKIP* program by providing 21 consultations and 34 tailored letters of support for various research grants that support improving children's pain management.



Facilitating Institutional Change

We want to improve pain management at every level, and from the inside out. SKIP partners with institutions to help them put evidence into practice, conducting assessments and making recommendations on how to move forward sustainably and effectively.

National Standard for Pediatric Pain Management

A working group of SKIP Hub Leads, other subject matter experts, and partners conducted a literature review to inform the first draft of a new national standard for pediatric pain management with the Health Standards Organization. We look forward to the release of the final Pediatric Pain Management Standard.

ChildKind International

SKIP collaborates with ChildKind International and others to identify pain champions and support institutions with implementation efforts. Nine institutions were supported in pursuing or progressing toward ChildKind certification.

Regional Hubs

SKIP's Hub Leads and Knowledge Brokers work together to advance children's pain management in their own institutions.

Raising Awareness & **Kickstarting** Conversation

An important part of knowledge mobilization is to make research easily accessible and usable by diverse groups. SKIP connects with patients, caregivers, health professionals, administrators, and policy makers using many different avenues of communication to amplify research and foster a sense of urgency around improving pain management for children.

During the 2020 Children's Healthcare Canada annual conference, SKIP hosted a panel session called "Updates from 2020: It's been a big year in children's pain," in which 90 live participants were a part of the North American launch of the Lancet Commission.

National Pain Awareness Week -#NPAW2020

SKIP partnered with Pain BC to lead a national social media campaign for National Pain Awareness Week from November 1-7, 2020. More than 125 organizations participated in the campaign reaching over 200,000 people and amplifying awareness and urgency of the issue of pain in children, alongside national efforts to improve pain for all people living in Canada.

Last year, our database grew to over 100 patients, parents, and other caregivers with diverse experiences who have signed up to contribute to SKIP's activities.
